From the President

August was a very busy month for genealogists and family historians.

AFFHO began the month with an Opening Event from Professor Larissa Behrendt with the topic Fictionalising the Family History - History is full of silences and there are often gaps in the family history. This is particularly so for First Nations families given the impact of the removal policy. So how can those blank spaces be filled, what can be 'imagined' and what can be reclaimed? How can the process of creative writing help find the forgotten stories and missing links? The Closing Event held on 31 August featured two speakers who gave us their insights into How to Bring your Ancestors to Life! Catherine Wall (YouTube Yorkshire's Hidden History) shared how to make history interesting, engaging and accessible for everyone. Daniel Horowitz (MyHeritage) demonstrated MyHeritage's latest tool DeepStory and how it can enhance your storytelling.

History in Paradise, the 16th Australasian Congress on Genealogy & Heraldry was held on Norfolk Island from 2nd to 4th August 2022. It was hosted by the Norfolk Island Museum and by all accounts was a most interesting and successful congress. AFFHO Congress 2022 – Norfolk Island

History in Paradise 2022 AFFHO Congress, postponed from 2021 due to Covid-19 and the ensuing lock-downs was re-scheduled to 1-4 August 2022. You could travel to Norfolk Island either from Sydney on 29th July or from Brisbane on Saturday. Keith, my husband and I travelled from Auckland via Sydney and arrived on Friday so we had the weekend to explore the island, as well as taking a Bus Tour of the Island with Kim Davies (a Pitcairn descendant) who told us the history and local information.

Our accommodation, at Paradise Hotel and Resort, also the location for the Congress, came with a car as there is no public transport on Norfolk. We loved the scenery and the history - Keith summed it up by announcing "It is a good job I didn't come when I was younger, as I would have stayed here forever".

(A sentiment not repeated by any of the convicts I am sure!)

In the evenings, meeting up with new acquaintances and meeting old friends from previous Congresses is always exciting. Robyn Williams, AFFHO President, arrived via Brisbane on Saturday. We have heard from the Conference Organisers on Norfolk Island that there were: 138 Full Registrations, 35 Social Registrations, 2 Keynote Speakers and 21 Concurrent Speakers (26 Sessions). I cannot comment on them all but here is an overview for you.

Congress started with a Trade Show in Rawson Hall, in Burnt Pine Village. After lunch we had two presentations that had been pre-recorded: Emily Hanna told us of the Norfolk Island Resources held at State Library NSW and Scott Fairie explained Army Pay Books held at The National Archives in London. Professor Noam Levin of the Biodiversity Research Group at University of

Queensland then explained their studies on the impact of European settlement on Norfolk Island through historical maps and aerial photographs, and copies of his maps adorned the walls of the hall.

Early Tuesday morning the telephone rang in our room, it was Robyn, "Guess what?" she said... "I have just tested positive for Covid!" So Robyn was imprisoned at the hotel and that was the last we saw of the President—she missed all of Congress. When she was released from quarantine, she did manage to tour the island and make up for a bit of lost time before flying home to New Zealand.

The Congress opened officially on Tuesday with Ray Martin, Ambassador to Norfolk Island, and a very popular broadcaster who gave the opening presentation on 'Discovering Who I am". After Morning Tea we had a choice of three presentations to choose from: Convicts, DNA, or Norfolk's First Settlement. After lunch we had three sessions with a choice of nine presentations followed by us all breaking into groups and going to Kingston, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, where guides took some of us round the Cemetery or the Island Museum. It was also an opportunity to go to the Research Centre at 9 Quality Row.

Professor Larissa Behrendt was the keynote speaker on Wednesday, she enthralled us with 'Removal and Reconnection: A Personal Family History', the story of Larissa's aboriginal grandmother, a Stolen Child, of her children living in orphanages and their struggle for survival, and the eventual re-connection with the *Eualeyai/Kamilaro* people.

There was a choice of two presentations after Morning Tea and then we were off again this time to visit Government House, home to the Administrator of Norfolk Island and not normally open to the public. By special privilege, we were invited to walk inside and see the rooms and furniture, some of which were crafted by convicts. Then we went in our groups for the Guided Tour of the Cemetery or the Island Museum Tour. The Cemetery is still in use today by the Islanders, it is fascinating as there are many convict graves, stories of rebellion and hangings, wonderful headstones carved by fellow convicts. The Island Museum tells the story of the arrival of the Pitcairn Islanders to Norfolk Island, and life on the Island.

During the Congress some of the presenters could not attend so we had a few presentations from people who kindly stepped it to fill the gaps. On Thursday we had a

wonderful presentation by Professor Darryl Low Choy who told us he was born in Australia, and when he started school "I came home from school singing a song I had learnt, the song was titled 'Ching Chong Chinaman', my mother said to me you shouldn't sing that song because you're Chinese. At the age of five I had no idea whatsoever I was different, and in fact, it didn't really resonate with me what Chinese meant." His parents and grandparents suffered generations of shame, being Chinese in a predominately white society in Far North Queensland under the White Australia Policy. Darryl has spent a lifetime since then researching

his family history, all the way back to China - made more difficult because he has never learnt to speak Chinese.

The closing presentation by keynote speaker Professor Larissa Behrendt was entitled 'Captured by Cannibals: the Life and Lies of Eliza Fraser'. Eliza was purportedly captured by the local *Butchulla* people after she was shipwrecked on their island in 1836, it was a fascinating story.

Congress 2022 was a wonderful opportunity to learn about the Pitcairn Islanders and their settlement on Norfolk Island, the Convicts and their sufferings, the wreck of the *Sirius*, stolen children, and life in early Australia. I even learnt how to catalogue all my books with *Librarything* thanks to Jill Ball. I do not have room to name all the presenters but we thank you all for your input into Congress.

The Congress Dinner was held at *Orn Daa Cliff*, at the opposite side of the island from the hotels so we were bussed there. We were treated to a feast of local produce, trumpeter fish and coconut-banana pie. The MC and musician for the evening was Trent Christian who kept the evening going with a swing. In the formal part of the evening, AFFHO Treasurer, Fay Carbis, announced the presentation of the Meritorious Awards to Martyn Killion and Linley Hooper. We Congratulate them both.

Then it was back to our hotels either to enjoy one more day on the Island or to pack and wing our way home next day.

Society of Australian Genealogists - 90th Anniversary

The Society of Australian Genealogists held their first meeting in Sydney on 29 August 1932. The SAG is fortunate to have Her Excellency the Honourable Margaret Beazley AC QC, Governor of New South Wales as Patron of our Society. Upon discovering it was our 90th anniversary in 2022 Her Excellency generously offered to host an afternoon tea at Government House Sydney as part of the celebrations.

On Tuesday 16 August members of the Society excitedly gathered in the ballroom at Government House with Her Excellency and Mr Wilson for an afternoon of reconnecting and reminiscing. The Governor and Mr Wilson both demonstrated a keen interest in family history as they formally congratulated the Society on its milestone anniversary and later mingled with guests.

The Society has a packed calendar of events to both celebrate our anniversary and the wider family history community. We planned a number of events specifically for those new to family history to celebrate NFHM, including a two-day intensive *Beginners Practical Introduction to Family History* course, our first substantial face to face event since the Covid pandemic started.

Author and academic Dr Betty O'Neill will facilitate a full day writing family history workshop at our Research Centre and Library on Friday 26 August. We also have two online presentations focussing on immigration to Australia, the first with Dr Perry Macintyre AM and Dr Liz Rushen AM and the second with Kerry Farmer. We will be rounding out the month with a session of our popular *First Look at AncestryDNA* webinar.

For NFHM we are also holding two free public webinars on Tuesday 23 August and Tuesday 30 August respectively. The first will feature a varied panel of family historians focusing on publishing and creative methods to encourage attendees to *Do SOMETHING with your family history!* and the second will be a webinar with Associate Professor Tanya Evans, discussing her recent book, *Family History, Historical Consciousness and Citizenship: A New Social History*.

Finally, what better time than NFHM to launch a book titled *The Good Genealogist: how to improve the quality of your family history research*, by Danielle Lautrec, one of the Society's dedicated archives and education volunteers.

At the SAG celebrated its 90th birthday we arranged for Melissa Hulbert (current president) to read out

Martyn Killion's **AFFHO Meritorious Service Award** nomination, which had been awarded on Norfolk Island at the AFFHO Congress.

Kerry Farmer then presented Martyn with the Award.




